



WHAT WE DO & IMPACT OF MENTORSHIP

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Toronto (BBBST) has created mentoring relationships that have changed the lives of children and youth in Toronto for over 100 years.

In 2024, BBBST mentors volunteered over **36,700 hours**, mentoring **1,488 youth**. With **89% efficacy**, BBBST proves that Littles achieve a positive outcome of improved social emotional skills because of our programs. As a result, young people succeed in school, overcome adversity and resist danger, maintain good mental and physical health, exhibit leadership and delay gratification, help others and value diversity.





Big Brothers Big Sisters of Toronto uses a 21-Question pre-post survey to measure impact. This survey is a reliable and valid assessment of the internal Developmental Assets, which include strengths, supports and noncognitive factors that are essential for young people's success in school and life. The survey measures the extent of exposure a young person has had to develop their assets and competencies. It is administered at the time of the baseline ie before a Little is matched with a Big and every 12 months after they're matched.



! Grow Group Based Programming

Under the ! AM Initiative, we have launched! Grow. This program is tailored to the needs of 2SLGBTQIA+ youth, offering a brave space to explore identity, address barriers and envision a positive future. We launched in Fall 2024 at Earl Haig Junior Public School and have engaged mentees in an interactive curriculum focusing on five themes:

- Community Connectedness
- Skill Development
- Personal Agency and Visibility
- Queer Futurism


Programming in Community

For the first time since 2019, we offered group-based programming outside of the TDSB. Through our partnership with the Waterfront Neighbourhood Centre (WNC), we adapted our current! Belong and !mpact Programming to be suitable for their youth. This resulted in an adapted 16 session co-ed curriculum that was integrated into their pre-existing camp structure for July and August. Additionally, we provided a Training for Impact workshop to their camp counsellors, teaching them about building Developmental Relationships.

Family Corner

We continue to strengthen our relationship with the incredible parent/guardians of our mentees. BBBST recently completed our Family Corner Engagement Survey to get a better understanding of the skill development requirements and informational resource needs of our parents and/or guardians at the agency. We had an overwhelming completion rate with almost 100 responses collected.

Some key findings showed that 83% of parents/guardians are interested in connecting with other caregivers at BBBST. Additionally, most would like information on mental health services, healthy eating habits and financial planning. Family Corner will mirror the format of our successful Mentors' Corner; providing a space for parents/guardians to connect with each other and share their experiences.



2024 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

We participated in almost 60 community events, workshops, conferences, volunteer fairs, and networking opportunities.

With a strong focus on volunteer recruitment, partnership building, and increasing our community presence, these events allowed us to connect with families, potential mentors, and community partners, strengthening our vision of empowering young people through mentorship.

Recognizing the importance of culturally specific engagement, we prioritized events that reflect the diverse backgrounds of the children, youth and families we serve. By tailoring our outreach to specific communities, we aimed to build trust, representation and meaningful connections.

It helped me feel more confident going into the next grade because I was new at the school and it helped me make friends and build up my confidence. It also helped me because it gave me a safe comfortable space outside of my home and in my school.



2024 BBBST STAFF TRAINING

Applying Knowledge, Building Connections

In 2023, our training emphasized the ability to unlearn and re-learn in areas such as Indigenous perspectives, Anti-Black Racism, and 2SLGBTQIA+ inclusion. In 2024, we moved beyond learning to action—deepening relationships and actively engaging with the communities we serve.

We continued our learning journey with another training session led by The 519, furthering our commitment to inclusivity. This year, we hosted an external consultant to deepen our understanding of Black and Indigenous experiences, reinforcing our dedication to equity. Additionally, we actively participated in community events, including Family Pride with Pride Toronto, the Eastview Pow Wow at Eastview Public School, and the 27th Annual Community Pow Wow with Native Child and Family Services of Toronto. We also hosted our own BBBST Black History Month event in partnership with A Different Booklist, celebrating Black culture and history.


These initiatives reflect our ongoing commitment to fostering meaningful, culturally responsive engagement to better serve the diverse youth in our programs.

BBBST CHALLENGES

Economic Challenges Faced by Funders

Due to issues beyond BBBST's control, we lost two essential investments in our funding portfolio. Since this loss was experienced in the third quarter of 2024, the organization did not have time to mitigate the shortfall in 2024, and will work to recoup and diversify our investments in 2025.

Absence of Government Funding

BBBST has been a trusted leader in mentorship for over 100 years. Our evidence consistently shows that mentoring improves social-emotional outcomes for BBBST youth, reducing long-term costs related to homelessness, mental health, social assistance and other future interventions. If the government increased investment, BBBST can expand its reach to more children and youth in Toronto, building stronger communities, and create social savings for Canadian taxpayers.

Recruiting Individuals with Daytime Availability

Through our incredible partnership with TDSB, we can serve hundreds of children and youth each year through our One-to-One and Group-Based Programming. However, we continue to struggle to find individuals with daytime availability to meet the ever-present demand for our daytime programming.

Children's Mental Health Crisis

We continue to see first-hand the rise in mental health concerns present across Toronto. 70% of children and youth have reported a worsening of their mental health since the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020¹. Children with no previous diagnoses are experiencing higher rates of depression, anxiety, irritability, and inattention post-pandemic². Mentees accessing our programming are facing more complex mental health needs than ever before. While we want every child to have access to a mentor, at times serious mental health concerns should be addressed prior to accessing mentorship. When this occurs, BBBST supports families through referrals and advocacy to ensure these needs are addressed prior to matching with a mentor.

Pre-Mature Closures

Throughout 2024, we saw a significant number of pre-mature match closures (33%) in our Community Based One-to-One Program. At the match closure interview, mentors and mentees or parent/guardians expressed a variety of reasons for the closure. Most of the closures were initiated by the mentors on account of personal life changes on their end, while the remainder of the closures occurred as mentees lost interest in the match.

STRENGTHENED PROGRAMS, GREATER IMPACT

Pumped for Post-Secondary Programs

Scotiabank

Our valuable partners at Scotiabank, through their ScotiaRISE Program, have committed \$535,000 over three years to maintain our programming in post-secondary schools in Toronto; also helping other BBBS agencies adopt post-secondary readiness mentoring programs in their communities across the country. The aim of this grant is to support BBBST's Pumped for Post-Secondary Program both here in Toronto and to help launch additional sites at locations throughout the country. This investment will aim to share this program methodology with all Big Brothers Big Sisters agencies across Canada by the end of Year Three.

School-Based Program Expansion Rossy Foundation

This incredible investment of \$1,200,000 over the next five years focuses on BBBST's One-to-One and Group-Based Programs operating in schools across Toronto. Investment in these programs not only helps to address current funding gaps, but will build long-term sustainability through hiring staff, expanding into new schools and developing new volunteer recruitment tools to ensure that these programs reach as many youth as possible. We are truly grateful for the ongoing support of the Rossy Foundation.

Youth ACEs Cohort Aubrey & Marla Dan Foundation

This \$300,000 investment will create a cohort of 30 youth from across Toronto who will be supported by the Aubrey & Marla Dan Foundation over the next three years. This cohort will be made up of youth who have faced three or more Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs - traumatic events that occur in childhood). These youth will participate in the community-based one-to-one mentoring program over the course of three years. BBBST, through our comprehensive evidence and impact framework, will be able to track the progress made by these youth over the course of their time spent in the program.


Mentors' Corner

In School Mentoring

The In School Mentoring (ISM) Program is a one-to-one mentorship program that occurs during the school day at a partnering TDSB school. Children referred to this program may face a variety of barriers to educational and/or social emotional success. Mentees who participate in our ISM programming report a stronger connection to their school community, improved attendance, increased academic performance and higher educational attainment.

Amplified School Impact Program (ASIP)

Our ASIP program adopts the core tenets of our ISM program but focuses on providing support to higher needs schools. The program utilizes students of Social Work and Child and Youth Care to provide mentorship to students and become additional supports to the general school community. Placement students in this program support a maximum of 8 students in one-to-one mentorship relationships. Our ASIP program expanded in 2024! The number of schools we served increased from 14 to 17, and onboarded an additional four placement students.

Impact BOYS MENTORING

Impact Boys Mentoring is a group-based mentorship program designed to engage boys in Grades 6 through 8. The program works to tackle issues such as toxic masculinity, high violence in the city, and positive self-identity in young boys. Adult mentors facilitate discussions, activities, and sessions with the mentees to provide a safer space for participants to build life skills, confidence, and resilience.

Belong GIRLS MENTORING

! Belong Girls Mentoring is a group-based mentorship program designed to engage girls through discussions and activities about healthy living, balanced eating, and feeling good about themselves. The program works to break down barriers and build positive identity in young girls.

! Thrive BLACK YOUTH MENTORING

After completing our first pilot years of the program, we gathered valuable feedback from key stakeholders including mentees, mentors, and school liaisons. This feedback allowed us to reflect on the strengths of the programs, identify areas of growth, and make improvements to the curriculum.




2024 Financial Highlights


